

Clause No. 1 in Report No. 3 of the Commissioner of Community and Health Services was adopted, without amendment, by the Council of The Regional Municipality of York at its meeting held on November 13, 2014.

Council also received and made public the two private attachments to this report.

1 COMMUNITY INVESTMENT STRATEGY PROJECTS RECOMMENDED FOR 2015 FUNDING

1. RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that:

- 1. Council approve the community projects listed in *Private Attachment 1* to be funded for one year in 2015 under the Community Investment Strategy.
- 2. Council approve multi-year funding for the community projects listed in *Private Attachment* 2 to be funded in 2015, 2016 and 2017 under the Community Investment Strategy, subject to budget approval.
- 3. The Commissioner of Community and Health Services be authorized to execute the agreements with the successful agencies, subject to review by Legal Services.
- 4. The Commissioner of Community and Health Services be authorized to allocate any new or related funding that may become available under the Community Investment Strategy to projects and activities that fall within the framework of the Community Investment Strategy; and that the Commissioner be authorized to execute Purchase of Service Agreements with agencies that meet this criteria.

2. PURPOSE

This report provides an update on the results of the 2015 Community Investment Strategy call for proposals process and provides a description of the projects recommended for 2015 funding in *Private Attachment 1* and *Private Attachment 2*. The attachments are private because they relate to the security of the property of the Region.

3. BACKGROUND

Council approved the Community Investment Strategy in February 2013

The goal of the Community Investment Strategy (Strategy) is to support the delivery of quality community services that address human service priorities as outlined in Regional strategies. The funding provided under the Strategy strengthens the capacity of York Region human services system and promotes innovative and collaborative programs and service delivery models.

The Strategy is specifically targeted to strengthen community services supporting low and moderate income residents living in York Region. This is accomplished through three funding streams:

- 1. **Community-Based Services**: investing in community-based social service programs/services that directly address human service gaps in York Region and align with Regional community investment results.
- 2. **Innovation and Collaboration**: supporting new initiatives that present multifaceted solutions through new, evolving and non-traditional models for working together and/or delivering social services.
- 3. **Organizational Development**: investing in professional development activities that strengthen an agency's capacity to provide services.

The Strategy has four Community Results aligned with corporate strategies. Under each Community Result specific Action Areas are included to address key service gaps for low and moderate income residents. The Community Results are:

- 1. **Community Health**: low and moderate income residents are healthy and able to make healthy choices.
- 2. **Economic Independence**: low and moderate income residents have and keep jobs that match their skills and have financial stability.
- 3. **Housing Stability**: low and moderate income residents can live in affordable, adequate and suitable housing.
- 4. **Social Inclusion**: low and moderate income residents are connected and able to engage in their communities.

4. ANALYSIS AND OPTIONS

The updated Community Investment Strategy is now in the second year of implementation

The Region first established a community investment strategy in 2002. In 2013, the Strategy was updated to include additional community results and a new two-stage call for proposal process.

The two-stage process is now in the second year of implementation. A communication plan was implemented to ensure agencies were aware of the call for proposal process. Stage One asked agencies to submit an Expression of Interest; communication included:

- An email blast was sent to approximately 147 agencies announcing the first stage of the call was available
- Advertisements were placed in all York Region Media Group newspapers and in ethnic newspapers
- Two information sessions were held in the spring of 2014, and a total of 114 individuals attended representing 91 agencies
- Information about the process was posted on the Region's Web site
- A dedicated community investment phone line and email account was available for agencies seeking clarification
- Technical assistance for agencies was also available from the Supplies and Service Branch

The Expression of Interest resulted in 110 proposals submitted

The first stage included an Expression of Interest (EOI) that opened on April 10, 2014 and closed on May 8, 2014. Each EOI briefly outlined the agency; described the project; identified the amount of funding needed; and demonstrated eligibility and fit with Regional strategies, the Community Results and Action Areas. Throughout this stage agencies were able to ask questions and seek clarification as they prepared their applications.

Upon closing, 110 EOIs were received requesting over \$12 million in funding. There is approximately \$6 million in funding available for 2015. A Selection Committee comprised of Community and Health Services Department staff reviewed the EOIs against the outlined eligibility and evaluation criteria. More than 60 EOIs were recommended to proceed to Stage Two. In general, those that did not move forward to Stage Two did not include a strong link to the four Community Results, did not clearly explain the gap in human services for low and moderate income residents or were not clear on their project goals.

The two-stage process provides agencies not moving to Stage Two additional time to research and apply for other funding.

To assist these agencies with future applications they were provided with feedback on their EOI at the time of notification and a more detailed feedback session is available upon request. Agency feedback indicates that they like the two-stage process and appreciate the feedback and the opportunity to ask questions.

One-year and multi-year funding are available for 2015

For 2015, agencies were invited to apply for one-year or multi-year funding. One-year funded projects must be delivered within the 12 month period between January 1, 2015 and December 31, 2015.

Multi-year funding is available for up to three years. Investment periods are based on available funds, the scope of each successful application, how well the application addresses the gap in the community and how clients will benefit.

Sixty-three applications were received in Stage Two, requesting over \$6.9 million in funding

In Stage Two, agencies provided a fuller description of their project including a detailed work plan and budget; specifics on the target population; how their project addresses service gaps in York Region; and how the project aligns with the Community Results and Action Areas. Upon closing, 63 eligible applications were received requesting over \$6.9 million. Of the 63 applications, 52 are recommended for 2015 funding totalling \$6,106,109. The 52 projects are outlined in *Private Attachment 1*.

The applications were evaluated by the same Selection Committee as in Stage One, as well as other funders including Ontario Trillium Foundation and United Way of York Region. The applications that fit most closely with the Community Result Action Areas and had the overall strongest scores are recommended for funding.

Of the 52 projects recommended for funding, 19 are recommended for multi-year funding, totalling \$2,080,457 (see *Private Attachment 2*).

Regional staff will meet with multi-year funded agencies during 2015 to assess project performance and discuss deliverables expected for 2016. A 2016 budget will be developed for each project, based on agreed service targets and any changes such as a cost of living increase or program expansion. Similar steps will be undertaken in 2016 to determine recommended funding amounts for 2017.

Using a cost of living allowance estimate of 2.5%, the estimated allocation for 2016 is \$2,132,468 and for 2017 is \$2,185,780.

Decisions on funding amounts for multi-year projects in 2016 and 2017 will be made by the Commissioner of Community and Health Services based on the list of projects to be approved in *Private Attachment 2* and available funding.

Pending Council approval, all agencies will be advised of the outcome of their Stage Two application. Those agencies with projects that were not successful in receiving funding in Stage Two will be provided with an opportunity to receive feedback and, where possible, include referrals to other sources of funding.

Funding enables residents to access a variety of services

The 52 projects recommended for funding will contribute to each of the Community Results and to regional economic vitality helping low and moderate income residents with access to basic needs and to find and keep housing and employment. Forty-eight are Community-Based Services projects representing 95 per cent of the allocated funding.

Table 1 shows 2015 projects recommended under the Community-Based Services Stream by Community Result.

Fourteen projects will focus on residents experiencing or at-risk of homelessness and will provide access to supports and services that include outreach and drop-in programs. education supports and case management to help them find and stay housed. Fifteen programs will foster economic independence and low and moderate income residents will have the opportunity to gain basic life skills, gain practical experience in a simulated or actual workplace, improve employment prospects and improve their financial literacy skills. As well, four programs will focus on community health initiatives providing

community meals, food security and food skills development and help to address the needs of a growing and diverse population. In addition, 15 projects that support social inclusion provide residents with programs that develop their skills and enable them to make a valuable contribution to the community.

The Strategy also provides funding for new collaboratives that offer innovative approaches to service delivery, engage new partners and build the capacity of the sector. Two collaboratives are recommended representing two percent of funding.

Under the Organization Development Stream, two agencies are recommended representing two percent of funding specifically to strengthen their organization through planning, organizational policy and procedure development and capacity building activities. These projects will not only support agency development but will also help to build a strong human services sector.

In many cases, the services provided by these agencies prevent low and moderate income residents from needing more costly or long-term services.

Link to key Council-approved plans

The Community Investment Strategy contributes to the Region's 2011 to 2015 Corporate Strategic Plan, specifically, to expand investment in programs provided by community partners to provide more community services. The Strategy also directly aligns with the Departmental Multi-Year Plan, York Region Immigration Settlement Strategy and the Human Services Planning Board, Making Ends Meet in York Region.

5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The 2015 Community Investment Strategy budget has \$6,108,487 available to allocate to one-year and multi-year projects as included in *Private Attachment 1* and *Private Attachment 2*. The multi-year projects included in *Private Attachment 2* will be evaluated annually for year two and year three commitments based on project objectives and available funding.

The Community Investment Strategy is the only funding program that the Region has to support community-based services for York Region residents, and the strengthening of the community service system in York Region. The Strategy has seen increasing demand for funding and an increase of eligible requests. Available funding for 2015 is only 49 per cent of requests received at Stage One, Expression of Interest. To meet increasing demand, an additional \$200,000 is requested for 2016. Additional funding under the Strategy would enable more projects to receive funding and build a larger network of supports in the community.

6. LOCAL MUNICIPAL IMPACT

The social, economic and demographic landscape of local municipalities has changed significantly over the years. The Community Investment Strategy provides a framework to address the emerging needs in each municipality through the provision of funding to agencies to build capacity, to create new and innovative partnerships and to deliver services to address the needs of low and moderate income individuals and families across the Region.

7. CONCLUSION

The Community Investment Strategy supports community health, economic independence, housing stability and social inclusion for low and moderate income York Region residents.

The Strategy builds on 10 years of community investment experience and provides a framework for not-for-profit agencies to effectively address emerging needs in York Region.
